A new tool to combat slips and falls on ice and snow!

The Conference Safety Committee, working with a supplier named “Winter Walking”, has identified two models of ice cleats that could reduce the risk of slips and falls for Custodians and others who work to clear snow and ice from sidewalks and parking lots. Serious injuries have been incurred by Conference employees performing their outdoor duties.

The two models of ice cleats are described below and are available in a variety of sizes. The vendor has devised an [order sheet](#) specifically for the Conference, which is available to you via QuikLINK and will be posted on the Safety Committee website.

LOW-PRO


LOW-PRO® Ice Cleat is a compact, light weight industrial strength ice and snow walking device that fits over all types of shoes and boots. Extremely easy to use and light in weight, they are virtually inconspicuous on the user’s foot. The traction comes from 26 minimally exposed tungsten carbide studs that allow the employee to gain traction in winter conditions while still being able to navigate clean surfaces with reduced risk of surface damage. This makes them generally safer to wear both indoors and while driving, reducing the need for your employees to continually remove them. **Current pricing: \$41.95/pair.**



LOW-PRO HEEL

Model - JD310

The LOW-PRO® HEEL ice cleat is a compact and light weight ice and snow walking device that fits easily and conveniently over all types of shoes and boots. It is extremely easy to use and can be put on or taken off in seconds. Weighing in at less than 4 ounces per foot, the LOW-PRO® HEEL is virtually inconspicuous on the user’s foot or when carried in a pocket. Central to the LOW-PRO® HEEL design is the 14 minimally exposed tungsten carbide studs that allow the wearer to gain traction in winter conditions while still being able to navigate clean surfaces with reduced risk of surface damage. **Current pricing: \$36.95/pair.**
